## The Week in Review

- For reading and language, we continued our "Neighborhood" unit. Our main reading selection for the week was Bus Stops. This book helped us to think about all of the places around town that a city bus may stop throughout the day. Another story read this week was titled "Ms. Mouse Needs a Friend". Ask your child what Ms. Mouse's problem was and what we learned from reading the story
- This week we had two high frequency words - "for" and "you". They should now recognize: I, can, we, the, like, a, see, go, to, have, is, play, are, for \& you.
- For math this week, we used candy hearts to complete some basic addition problems. We also sorted the candy hearts and graphed them by color. We reviewed the concepts of most and least and discussed how graphs help us organize information. The classes also used a double ten frame to represent the teen numbers. After some practice, the children played a game with a partner by spinning a teen number, representing it on their double ten frame and then comparing to see who had the larger number. We also discussed that the "equal" symbol is a way to show that two quantities are the same. The children took turns showing the same number in different ways (fingers, ten frames, etc.) and then determining they were equal.
